

## **BIOSECURITY PROTOCOLS FOR FARM/RANCH VISITORS**

Sw Sc <u>He</u>	ot-and-Mouth Disease (FMD), Hog Cholera (Classical Swine Fever), African Horse Sickness, Vesicular Stomatitis vine Vesicular Disease, African Swine Fever, Avian Influenza, Exotic Newcastle Disease, Sheep and Goat Pox, rewworm, among others. the red	ople who have traveled internationally should not have direct contact with pets or farm animals for 7 days after eir departure from the international farm or ranch. Do not pet, touch, feed or care for animals (CDC commendation). After the 7-day waiting period, the foreign traveler should wear clean clothing and footwear on ms.
Retui	rning home to the farm (or farm visits by international visitors):
2. 3. 4. 5. 6. 7.	must not be used on hands, face or skin. FAO AHM 12). If boots/footwear cannot be adequately cleaned and disinfected, do not use them on the tour.  Wash all clothing worn around animals in a foreign country before returning to the U.S. If clothing cannot be adequately cleaned, do not use them on the tour.  Thoroughly scrub hands with soap and water and clean under fingernails after contact with livestock or poultry. Shower before leaving the foreign country, thoroughly washing hair and the body parts that were exposed to the livestock/poultry (hands, face, neck, arms, etc.).  Do not bring equipment used around foreign livestock or poultry.  Do not bring back meat or animal products from a foreign country unless inspected and approved. Items such as cameras, jewelry, watches, eyeglasses, hair pieces/extensions and hats are difficult to disinfect should they become contaminated. These items may transmit disease if not properly handled – avoid wearing/using them around U.S. animals.
	Thoroughly clean and disinfect boots and footwear with an effective product before leaving the country (e.g., 1 part concentrated household chlorine bleach in 3 parts water applied after removing dirt/organic material. This
